The College of Education and Human Development's teacher preparation programs are state (DOE) and nationally (NCATE) accredited, which means that our college meets rigorous national standards in preparing teachers and other classroom specialists. In a public opinion poll conducted by Penn and Schoen and cited on the NCATE website, 82 percent of the public favors requiring teachers to graduate from nationally accredited professional schools.

ABOUT THE COLLEGE

The College of Education and Human Development emphasizes a diverse liberal arts background, the latest technology, academic specialization, professional training and field experiences to prepare teachers and other professionals as outstanding practitioners and enthusiastic role models for lifelong learning. After successfully completing graduation requirements and the state-required examination, graduates in elementary education, secondary education, early childhood education, and kinesiology and physical education are recommended for Maine provisional teaching certificates.

The college's kinesiology and physical education program provides training and professional experiences for teachers and exercise science specialists. Students use the latest technology to measure and analyze human movement, development and deviation; gain experience in a variety of clinical settings; and work with children with special needs to help develop appropriate and responsive programs.

The child development and family relations curriculum has earned Family Life Educator designation from the National Council of Family Relations. Students in human development and family relations explore the growth and development of individuals in the contexts of families, schools and communities. Study may focus on individuals at various times in the lifespan (e.g., early childhood, adolescence, adulthood) with special attention to the family context. The family is studied in its various forms (e.g., single-parent, two-parent families, foster families). The major includes an early childhood education option.

The college's teacher preparation programs are approved by the Maine Department of

Education and accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.

UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH AND SCHOLARSHIP

The College of Education and Human Development is responsible for teacher preparation, educational and family studies research, and service to Maine schools and communities. Its teaching and research generate solutions and innovative approaches to school reform and societal issues, and stimulate scholarship and inquiry that enriches the undergraduate program through exposure to the creation and application of new knowledge.

College-based research and resource areas include: the Center for Research and Evaluation; the Maine Education Policy Research Institute; the Child Development Learning Center; the Maine Literacy Partnership and Reading Recovery; the Maine Writing Project; the Maine Center for Sport and Coaching; the National Collaborative for Hazing Research and Prevention; and the TRIO programs — Talent Search and the Maine Educational Opportunity Center.

STUDENT AWARDS AND RECOGNITION

Students are encouraged to apply for scholarships, including the Katherine Miles Durst Scholarship and Project Reach. Special recognition of students includes UMaine 4.0 GPA Presidential Pin Awards and membership in Kappa Delta Pi honor society.
