<u>Concrete Field Testing Technician Certification</u> - CPM Constructors paid for three of our students to take the certification exam last spring. Dragon Cement has agreed to participate next year. We need to get the message to students that professional exams and certifications will help with employment and to achieve higher starting salaries.

<u>Program Changes</u> – Several changes were made to the curriculum. An extra credit was added to construction surveying to include G.P.S. and more hands on exercises. Construction law was moved to the junior level. A separate course focusing on construction documents will be taught. A course on construction administration exercises will start in the Spring 2002. ***
