Clay Skulls¹

Instructions:

Step 1

Shape your ball of clay into something resembling an egg, then slightly pinch one end to create the jaw portion of the skull, leaving the upper portion rounder for the top of the head.



Step 3 Create two eye sockets using your pinky or a pencil eraser. Use a fingernail or tip of a pencil to create two oval nostril holes. These can be parallel or shaped like an upside-down heart.



Step 2 Pinch and slightly pull out on the areas just above the narrowed jaw to create cheekbones.



Step 4 Using something pointed to etch teeth into the jaw portion of the skull.

Ojo de Dios (God's Eyes)^{2,3} Instructions:

Beginning in the center, wrap a piece of yarn around all the way around one stick before taking it over to the next stick.

Repeat this process for each stick, rotating your crossed sticks in a circle as you work. Whether you wrap the yarn over the sticks or under doesn't matter, as long as you are consistent.

When you want to switch to a new color, simply cut your yarn, and tie it to a new piece of yarn. Trim the ends and continue weaving. Be sure to keep your knot and the tails of yarn to the back of the project as you begin weaving with your new color.





Many helpful videos can be found on the internet to demonstrate this craft. This one by Kristen Polson does a good job of showing how to begin, change colors, and even complete the craft with no knots!

Paper Flowers^{4,5} Instructions: Start with 4-6 tissue paper squares in a stack.

Accordion fold the stack of paper to about a 1-inch width, first one direction, then the other, until you have a single, 1-inch wide paper strip.





Attach pipe cleaner at center of paper strip, either by folding the pipe cleaner in half and sliding over the paper strip, or by wrapping one end of the pipe cleaner around the center of the paper strip.

(Optional) Fold paper strip in half so both ends are together. Use a pair of scissors to shape the edge of the paper strip to make a scalloped border for your flower petals.

Open paper accordion (now secured in middle by pipe cleaner) and tease apart layers of paper to make the flower full. Adjust shape as desired.

Paper Coffin Instructions:

Step 1: Cut out the coffin and lid along the solid lines.



Step 3: Fold the coffin lid along the dashed lines and attach the triangular flaps to the sides using a glue stick.

Step 2: Fold the coffin along the dashed lines to form its shape. Attach the triangular flaps to the sides using a glue stick and let dry.



Step 4: Once glue has dried, fit the lid to the coffin.





Supplies

- Tissue paper (red, orange, yellow, black, white)
- Fuzzy pipe cleaners (black)

Steps

- 1. Cut out two circles, about the diameter of a coffee mug, from the black tissue paper. Set aside.
- 2. Cut out two more circles, smaller, from the red, orange, or yellow tissue paper.
- 3. Glue one of the smaller colored tissue paper circles onto the center of each black tissue paper circle.
- 4. Fold both circles in half separately, and from the center fold outwards, ruffle the circles into a bow shape.



- 5. Once both are ruffled, use a pipe cleaner to hold the tissue paper "wings" together, leaving some excess at the top to become the "antennas".
- 6. Cut off the excess pipe cleaner for your desired wing length and fold the tips in on themselves to create a bulb effect at the ends
- 7. Reposition the wings to your liking. The idea is for the lower wings to fan out more into a rounded shape, like a real butterfly.
