What are some characteristics of a Jewish TANAKH translation?

- It is circumscribed and unified by the canon of authoritative texts the Rabbis formally accepted around the 2nd century CE
- The Hebrew used is the Masoretic Text. All variants appear as notes but not in the text itself.
- Heavy if not exclusive reliance on the scholarship of Jewish scholars and commentators for its interpretation of the Hebrew text.
- Translation is published to serve as an accompaniment to the Hebrew.
 Features could include:
 - Hebrew and English are printed side by side
 - Sections are designed with some Hebrew titling and according to weekly liturgical portions
 - The page numbering proceeds from right to left

Legends of the Name and Its Power

Judah ha-Nasi claimed that King David had been saved in a battle thanks to the Name. According to the story, King David's nephew Abishai pronounced the Name, whereupon the king was momentarily levitated above the battleground. When the danger passed, Abishai pronounced the Name again, and David was safely returned to Earth. (Talmud, *Sanhedrin* 95a)

According to Rava [head of the Pumbedita academy], the prophet Isaiah uttered the Name and was thereupon swallowed by a cedar tree. (Talmud, *Yevamot* 49b)

Rava himself . . . knew the Name and used it to create a human being, which he sent to his friend Rav Zera. (Talmud, *Sanhedrin* 65b)

The Egyptian man the Torah describes beating a Hebrew man (Exodus 2:1) died when Moses did no more than utter the Name. (Shemot Rabbah)
