National Experts on Autism and Literacy to Provide Training and Support to Maine Educators

Nationally recognized experts on literacy and ASD, Dr. Christi Carnahan and Dr. Pam Williamson, will conduct a two-day workshop to discuss the literacy needs of your students with autism spectrum disorder. The two-days will focus on instructional approaches to meet these learners' needs. In a fast paced, engaging format, participants will learn about the factors that influence reading and writing across the autism spectrum, develop a framework for thinking about literacy instruction, and be introduced to specific strategies for meeting these learners' needs. Maine Autism Leadership Team (MALT) News

Congratulations to our new Maine Autism Leader Teams!

Recently the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention released statistics stating that 1 in 68 children are being diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder (ASD). Each year this incidence rate increases, as does the complexity of these children. As a result, schools are stretched to educate and support children in an effective way.

In response to this need MAIER invited applications for school districts and agencies to receive advanced training in evidence-based practices for working with individuals with autism. 14 teams were selected to participate as Maine Autism Leader Teams, joining the existing 28 teams.

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In response to this need MAIER invited applications for school districts and agencies to receive advanced training in evidence-based practices for working with individuals with autism. 15 teams were selected to participate as Maine Autism Leader Teams, joining the existing 28 teams. Teams will receive six days of training (three two-day training sessions) with coaching and mentoring opportunities provided between training sessions. Team members include general and special educators, related services staff, and general and special education administrators.

The overall goals of the training are to:

- Build local capacity to establish and implement proactive and positive programming with fidelity for children with ASD,
- Build regional and state experts, trainers and supports for Maine's educators working with students with ASD.
- Foster the development of observational skills for working with children with autism spectrum disorder,
- Provide current information about the diverse range of individuals who exhibit characteristics associated with ASD.
- Ensure that Maine teachers and paraprofessionals are appropriately and adequately prepared to work with children with ASD, and
- Provide participants with sufficient current and evidence-based information that enables them to share materials with others in their district and to conduct training at the local, regional and/or state level.

To date, 28 teams have been trained in the previous three years. An outgrowth of this team training has been the creation and ongoing support of an autism leadership network across the state. Over 200 autism leaders are employed by agencies and school districts across the state to promote sustainability and to scale up efforts.



Tony's Summer at Camp CARDNE

My son Tony, who is now 16 years old, has attended camp CARD (Center for Autism and Related Disorders) in York, Maine for the last two years. Tony has Asperger's Syndrome, which makes other summer camps too challenging for him.

As an older camper at Camp CARD, Tony goes on work sites each day and learns new job skills; but more importantly, he learns what it takes to have a job. All of the teens that are in this program get paid \$10.00 a day. He has learned so much about himself while at camp CARD and has grown in many ways.

Tony now looks forward to going to camp each day and refers to it as "going to work." He has learned the correlation between working and earning money for it,

and takes each new job seriously. He has learned patience and tolerance with himself and with others, and he has gained a lot of self-confidence. Tony recalls, "My favorite part of going to Camp CARD was learning how to interact with lots of different people, and learning how to do various jobs in the community."

Camp CARD is small and has a ratio of about seven or eight campers to at least three adults. It is a safe place to learn the all-important social skills and to develop personal relationships. Tony really enjoys this camp and will forever benefit from all that he learns there. For teens interested in Camp CARD, Tony offers this advice, "Get ready to make friends with your co-workers, your counselors, and Belle the dog."



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
