# Maine's Timber Harvesting Rules



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### 2 quick definitions

### Diameter Breast Height (DBH)

- Measuring the diameter of a tree 4.5' above the ground.
- Merchantable trees are generally 4.5" or larger at DBH

Basal Area (BA)

• If all trees in one acre were cut off at 4.5', the resulting area face would be basal area per acre

Trees Cut off at 4.5' above ground

# Philosophy

- Maine Forest Service's regulatory philosophy is three-tiered:
  - we seek to prevent violations from happening in the first place through education and outreach;
  - we intervene where we see potential problems and help people comply;
  - and, as a last resort, we take enforcement action.
  - Bear in mind that this presentation is "RULES LIGHT"

### Forest Practices Act

- Applies Statewide
- Governs the size, location and regeneration of clearcuts
- Openings of less than 5 acres are considered patches, not clearcuts
- Promotes clean water by creating buffer zones around clearcuts



# Regulations are more strict with increasing clearcut size

- Category 1: 5-20 acres
  - separated from other clearcuts by 250' strip of non-clearcut land, with 30 ft<sup>2</sup> BA <4.5" DBH</li>
- Category 2: 21-75 acres
  - separated from other clearcuts by at least 250' strip equal in size to clearcut, with 40 ft<sup>2</sup> BA <4.5"</li>
  - Harvest plan

- Category 3: 76-250 acres
  - Separated from other clearcuts by 250' strip equal in size to clearcut
  - $40 \text{ ft}^2 \text{ BA} < 4.5" \text{ DBH}$
  - Harvest plan
  - Prior approval by MFS
- No clearcuts larger than 250 acres

### Forest Operations Notifications

- All timber harvesting activities covering more than 2 acres MUST be notified to the state.
- Must be signed by landowner, harvester, and, if employed by the forester
- Addresses activities within <u>shoreland zones</u> of the state, including water crossings and harvesting, land conversions
- Triggers visits by Forest Rangers, a Landowner Report at the end of the calendar year.

### Harvesting Around Water Bodies

- 3 different sets of rules for different areas of the state
- Statewide Standards For Timber Harvesting and Related Activities in Shoreland Areas (SWS) applies in organized towns that have adopted the rule
- Chapter 27 applies to unorganized or de-organized towns
- Mandatory Shoreland Zoning Act (MSZA) applies in organized towns that have not adopted SWS (option 3)

# SWS

(Applies in towns which have adopted the rules)

- These rules apply to timber harvesting activities near streams, lakes, ponds or wetlands, or when building logging roads near or across the above.
- They DO NOT apply to clearing for land development
- MFS encourages towns to adopt SWS

#### Rules Apply

- Adjacent to all streams, most ponds and wetlands, Shoreline Integrity Must Be Protected
- 2. Within 75' of streams that drain between 300 acres and 25 square miles
- 3. Within 250' of many lakes, ponds, rivers, streams and nonforested wetlands, as well as all tidal waters



### Within the buffered zones

#### 75' Buffer

#### 250' Buffer

- Well distributed, windfirm stand
- NO cleared openings
- 3 options for compliance:
  - 40% volume removal
  - 60 ft<sup>2</sup> BA residual
  - Outcome based

- Well distributed, windfirm stand
- Cleared openings <14,000 ft<sup>2</sup> between 75' and 250'
- Same 3 options for compliance

# Harvesting in Un(De)-organized towns

#### MFS Chapter 27

- Timber harvesting, land management roads, water crossings, gravel pits less than 5 acres
- Located in
  - Management subdistricts
  - Protection subdistricts

#### LUPC Chapter 10

- Timber harvesting, land management roads, water crossings, gravel pits less than 5 acres
- All gravel pits over 5 acres
- Located in all other districts

Key at the bottom shows what agency is responsible for which activity in which zone

# MSZA

- Applies in towns that have not adopted SWS
- Enforcement is by the individual towns and Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), not MFS
- Municipalities can adopt more restrictive standards than those set in this law, so shoreland zoning requirements are NOT the same in every town

### MSZA applies: (Beware: Town may choose to zone additional areas)

- within 250' of:
  - Great ponds (>10 acres)
  - Rivers
  - Tidal waters, coastal wetlands
  - Non-forested freshwater wetlands >10 acres (often zoned Resource Protection, Limited Residential or General Development
- within 75' of streams below the outlet of a great pond



Figure 3: Shoreland zoning requirements including zone width. Diagram provided by DEP.

### Natural Resources Protection Act (NRPA)

- Regulates activities in and adjacent to Protected Natural Resources
- Enforcement generally DEP but MFS and LUPC have regulatory role in unorganized towns
- Timber harvesting is exempt from NRPA, but several associated activities require permits.
  MFS issues the permits by rule (PBR) in <u>ALL</u> towns, org or unorg
  - Activity within Protected Natural Resource
  - Permanent stream crossings
  - Earth disturbing activities

# Best Management Practices (BMPs)

- A program of the MFS to protect water quality on the job
- Recommended procedures that when used appropriately will result in the greatest protection of the environment over the course of a forestry harvesting operation
- Whole manual outlining specific procedures during all phases of a job
