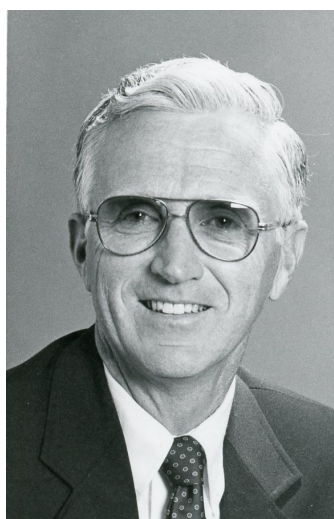

Letter from the Chair of the Board
October 24, 2025

Thanks to the foresight of the founders of the Page Farm and Home Museum and the many donors who have supported the Museum during both the highs and lows we have faced; I am pleased to report that the Museum is on solid footing. Details are available in the report of our Finance Chair, Amos Orcutt.

Even though the Museum was without indoor plumbing for seven weeks this summer, we were able to reschedule the tours and programs originally scheduled for that time. We have seen a massive increase in college class tours as well as homeschool groups.

We are in the process of restoring the Blacksmith Shop, which was a gift from Charles and Alice Smith. The Carpenter Shop completed the grape arbor, which was extended an additional four feet to meet the entire width of the fencing. They also rebuilt the doors on Anne's house, the garden shed named after long time friend, Anne Johnson.

Matthew Magnani's Museum Anthropology class developed a new virtual tour of the Museum, which can be found on our website and was featured on Fogler Library's Digital Commons@UMaine website.

Staff member Katie has continued to make progress on having all our artifacts digitized, photographed and available for the public to view via our website.

As always, I am grateful for the leadership of Patty Henner and for the continued support of our many friends and donors. We live in uncertain times and fortunes that rise can also fall. Your annual support helps maintain programs and support workstudy students. On behalf of the Board of Directors, Thank You.

2025 Report of the Executive Director

Patronage:

Since last October, 2024, we have hosted 47 individual groups, including college classes, area day programs, etc., for tours, individualized programs and/or presentations. In addition, we cataloged 8,177 independent visitors to the Museum.

Education:

Pathways to the Past: Pathways is the Museum tour menu offered to school and home-school groups. For the academic year 2024/2025, we facilitated 51 field trip experiences for school grades k through high school. Field trip season for school groups is typically April to June. Homeschool field trips are particularly on the rise.

Outreach and Programming:

Matthew Magnani's Museum Anthropology class developed a new virtual tour of the Museum, which is located on the Virtual Visit page of our website.

Patty and Gretchen, the director of the Hudson Museum, guest lectured Liam Riordan's Local History class in late March. This lecture was followed by a class visit to each facility.

Mary Freeman brought her Maine History class for a presentation and guided tour.

Jordan Ramos hosted *Maine Wild Blueberry Harvest Heritage: painting series, exploring the interconnected relationship between fields and communities* exhibition.

Maine National History Day took place on May 3. We presented a Passport to the Past scavenger hunt activity.

The Great Fall Potato Sale, while not quite as successful as prior years, netted us 144 individual orders. We will need to identify a new vendor, as our current vendor is retiring from farming.

Ye Olde Holiday Shoppe was well attended. The vendors were quite happy. The Museum took a nose-dive financially. We only sold half of our wreaths. Six booked vendors no-showed. With increases in advertising, we realized that we needed to make some changes to the program. We are a non-profit entity and, as such, do not strive to make a fortune, but we would like to break even for this program. This year, we are aligning our shoppe with the Hudson Museum's Holiday Market.

Collection:

Galen Lander donated his multi-generationally owned and operated 1939 Allis-Chalmers tractor to us. If you refer to the front cover of the Annual Report, you will see it temporarily parked in front of the garden. Our plan is to move the tractor into the Winston E. Pullen Carriage House before winter.

Katie and (sometimes) Patty are still working through problem files in PastPerfect. Katie is simultaneously inputting new records for recently donated collections. We have several newly donated collections to process. We will provide public access on our website by the end of the calendar year, including photographs in the records files.

Operations:

We survived without indoor plumbing for most of the summer due to the discovery of a collapsed sewer pipe tied to the construction of the new Aquaculture Center behind the Museum. We had to reschedule many homeschool field trips, making our busy Fall even busier.

Finance Committee Report

October 24, 2025

The Museum has had another financially successful year. We are all very grateful for your support. Carry over funds at the end of fiscal year 2025 (June 30) totaled \$280,487. Revenue was \$182,486 and expense \$160,222 vs the budgeted amounts of \$185,472 and \$186,122 respectively, leaving a carry over of \$22,264 for the fiscal year.

The value of endowments is \$3,499,879 as of 6/30/25. This compares to our endowment value 10 years ago of \$1,885,289 a significant increase. Income from the endowments is \$93,636 which represents a variety of named funds restricted for various purposes.

The Board voted to establish a maintenance reserve account from the Henry & Phyllis Page Endowment Fund (general operating), which will set aside approximately \$30,000 per year.

Because of the Board's and Patty Henner's smart budgeting, planning, and management the museum is financially sound.

We wish to thank the dean of the College of Earth, Life and Health Science, Diane Rowland, and in particular Dr. Lee Hecker, Assistant Director of MAFES for their support of the museum and its advocacy.

I encourage everyone to visit and contribute to the Page Farm and Home Museum which preserves Maine's agricultural heritage.
