This means that where our seven universities and Law School were each formerly evaluated on their own for how well they met a recognized set of quality standards, our System as a whole is now evaluated on that basis."

Members of a technical review panel and an institutional roundtable are kicking off their work providing expert input for the next incarnation of the Carnegie Classifications of Institutions of Higher Education, which will include a new classification system based on how institutions support students' social and economic mobility.
