Philosophy Department Colloquium Talk: "Sketch of a Phenomenological Plato"

Featured topic:

Phenomenology is typically taken to be anti-Platonist: human beings are constrained by a horizon of finitude, and thus resoluteness in the face of anxiety or boredom and, ultimately our death, is the limit of any transcendence we may be capable of. This paper will argue, on the contrary, that meaningfulness is impossible without Platonic forms and the ideals to which they give rise. I will show that Plato's forms function erotically (as invitations), provoke creativity, generate the criteria of better and worse, and demand a universal recognition and promotion of all that "participates" in forms. I will conclude by suggesting that Plato's forms are metaphysically real, and not the operators of some kind of constituting consciousness.

Marxist politics has often focused on seizing state power through revolutionary or electoral means, producing mostly failures of great bloodshed and violence, coup d'états, and weak social democratic policies. In Brazil, the Landless Workers Movement (MST) has adopted a different strategy to build socialism: tracts of underutilized land "occupied" by hundreds of impoverished and marginalized families and turned into farming cooperatives that typically have their own schools and health care facilities. The MST has its own university near São Paulo for training activists from around the world. The MST's strategy has been, by most measures, enormously successful, with 1.5 million members and thousands of cooperative settlements in Brazil.
