From the Chair

It is a pleasure to bring you this newsletter. As these pages will illustrate, the sociology faculty have again been very productive in teaching, research, and service on and off the campus. Our courses continue to be in heavy demand, and we are pleased to be able to serve our majors and so many other undergraduates in this manner. Our faculty have also continued to publish in many outlets in sociology and related areas and to work closely with selected students on research projects.

Our mission as an undergraduate department remains the same: to "seek beneath the surface of common sense definitions of social reality and identify the more fundamental social processes that affect us," as our mission statement reads, and by so doing to contribute to the liberal arts mission of the University. To prepare our majors and other students

to be knowledgeable citizens and employees, we emphasize critical thinking skills in our teaching and provide our majors excellent training in research methodology. Issues of race/ethnicity, social

class, gender, and other sources of inequality permeate all three areas of our department mission.

Jane Addams, a founder of American sociology and a winner of the Nobel Peace Prize for her legendary work at Hull House in Chicago, once wrote, "The good we secure for ourselves is precarious and uncertain until it is secured for all of us and incorporated into our common life." In our teaching, research, and service, the Sociology Department aims to help turn Addams' vision into reality.

Faculty Highlights

In Fall 2010, **Professor Steve Barkan** published an introduction to sociology textbook, *Sociology: Understanding and Changing the Social World*, with Flat World Knowledge (FWK). The book is now available in both a brief edition and a comprehensive edition. FWK publishes textbooks in several disciplines and makes them available online for free (yes, free!) or via alternatives (print, PDF, audio, e-book) that cost only about \$25-\$35. Because a single textbook can easily cost more than \$150 and many

students spend at least \$900 annually on textbooks, the FWK business model represents an exciting trend in textbook publishing, and Steve is happy to be one of its authors.;

In other activities, Steve published the fifth edition of his *Criminology: A Sociological Understanding* (Prentice Hall) (Spring 2011); he participated in a session on criminology and sociology programs at the annual meeting of the American Society of Criminology

Markides wins European Union Literature Award

A native of Cyprus, Professor Kyriacos Markides has won the 2011 Literature Award for the European Union as a representative of that country. This honor was presented in Hungary at the Budapest Book Trade Show that took place April 14-17, 2011.

As the current head nation of the European Union, Hungary wanted to honor authors from the EU countries who have had their works translated into Hungarian. Each member nation of the EU was asked to nominate and send to the festival one of its authors whose books have been published in Hungarian, and the festival featured various presentations by these authors. The government of Cyprus has selected our own Kyriacos Markides as their representative. As part of the festivities, Professor Markides did presentations about his work. We congratulate him on this honor!

Books Published and Awards Received!

Markides to publish next book in '12

Inner River is the latest in the series of books on Christian mysticism written by Kyriacos Markides. Now in the final editing stages, it is set to be released sometime in 2012.

Inner River begins where The Mountain of Silence and Gifts of the Desert left off. In many ways, Inner River is a natural continuation of the spiritual quest that Markides began years ago and developed in later books in his investigations into Eastern Christianity with Father Maximos. But at the same time, Inner River represents a unique shift from Markides' previous form of exploration. In this latest manuscript, Markides' own voice is more pronounced as he offers more of his personal views, reflecting upon and synthesizing his thirty-some years of research and explorations in an effort to bridge the gulf separating the mystic tradition of Eastern Christianity with the modern world.

Somalis in Maine: Crossing Cultural Currents to be released in June 2011

Somalis in Maine: Crossing Cultural Currents edited by Kimberly A. Huisman, Mazie Hough, Kristin M. Langellier, and Carol Nordstrom Toner.

Mark Paul Richard of the State University of New York at Plattsburgh says it best when he states:

"Somalis in Maine: Crossing Cultural Currents enhances our understanding of recent immigration in the United States by exploring the experiences of East African Muslim refugees in Maine. Through a combination of scholarly essays and first-hand accounts by Somali community members, this work sheds light on pre-migration experiences in Somalia, regional migrations in Africa, migration to and re-migration in the United States, and settlement and community formation in Lewiston, Maine. Somalis in Maine illustrates well the challenges that Somali immigrants have faced in all of these aspects of the migration experience. This work also considers the tensions Somalis have faced within their own community as they have sought to adapt to life in U.S. society. Like the French-Canadian immigrants who preceded them to Lewiston, Somalis appear to be actively negotiating the terms of their entry into U.S. society, thus challenging contemporary notions of the process of assimilation."

Barkan textbook now available online

In last year's *Social Facts*, you read about the upcoming new textbook by Professor Barkan that would be giving students the option to use a free online version. This text book is now online and is being used in the Spring 2011 curriculum.

The book is also available printed in black and white or in color for those who would like a book. Professor Barkan says, "I'm very gratified that my students can read this textbook online for free or buy a print copy for just \$35. This compares to at least \$100-\$150 for a new textbook published the traditional way. I hope it's a good textbook, but I know it's not costing them much, and perhaps nothing at all!"

(November 2010); he organized and participated in workshops on textbook publishing at the annual meetings of the Eastern Sociological Society (February 2011) and the Southwest Social Science Association (March 2011), and he organized three sessions for the upcoming annual meeting of the American Sociological Association (August 2011).

In the fall 2011, **Professor Amy Blackstone** will begin serving as the new chair of the Sociology Department. We welcome her leadership and guidance and thank Steve Barkan for his many years of service.

Professor Blackstone is also now serving as a member of the ADVANCE grant's Social Science Research Team (along with Susan Gardner in Higher Ed, a co-PI on the grant, and Shannon McCoy in Psychology). In support of the grant's goals of supporting effective policies and programs aimed at the recruitment, retention, and advancement of women faculty and of helping to create a positive work environment, the social science research team (SSRT) will examine changes in UMaine institutional, departmental, and system cultures over time through interdisciplinary, mixed methods research. The main goal of the SSRT is to expand knowledge and contribute to literatures in workplace culture and retention, particularly as related to women faculty in science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and the social and behavioral sciences. The grant is a 5-year, \$3.3 million grant.

In keeping with the new tradition of publishing textbooks through Flat World Knowledge, **Professor Amy Blackstone** is currently writing a research methods textbook which will be published next year. Additional works this year by Professor Blackstone include:


