The 2016 Marcia Smargon Kornetsky Sociology Prize has been awarded to Harold "Trey" Stewart. Trey is from Aroostook County in Maine and has been at UMaine for the past 4 years. His exceptional academic and public service record gave the department no doubt that he earned this highest honor the sociology department can give.

Harold "Trey" Stewart III is a native of Presque Isle. During his time at the University of Maine he double majored in Political Science and Sociology and double minored in Legal Studies and Business Administration. Trey is also a member of five academic honors societies. He is heavily involved in on-campus activities and was a leader in many organizations including his fraternity Alpha Tau

The Department of Sociology is very pleased to announce that in Fall 2016 we will welcome new faculty member, Karyn Sporer, PhD. Karyn is coming to us from the University of Nebraska where she successfully defended her doctoral thesis on May 3, 2016 to receive her PhD in Criminology and Criminal Justice. Karyn will be teaching SOC 101, Intro to Sociology, and SOC 214, Crime and Criminal Justice, in the Fall 2016.

Karyn's main research interests are in the areas of family violence and victimization, mental illness and violence, and violent extremism and terrorism. An advocate for persons with mental illness and their loved ones, Karyn has dedicated her research agenda and professional service to addressing social issues associated with mental illness and the mental health system. She received her BA from Saint Michael's College in Vermont, her MS in criminal justice from Northeastern University, and her PHD in criminology and criminal justice at the University of Nebraska at

The Easterns, CUGR, and ASA Honors

Third year students Haleigh Moran '17 and Katrina Ogden '17 have worked on a research project entitled "Depression and Adolescent Violence: Making Sense of Inconsistent Findings." Their findings were incorporated into a poster that they presented at the Eastern Sociological Society's Annual Meeting in March 2016. They were then able to take this poster and present at the Undergraduate Student Research Symposium

which took place in April. Both Haleigh and Katrina were accepted as American Sociological Association Honors Students and will be attending the ASA Annual Meeting in Seattle, WA in

August.

Haleigh reported on their ESS Experience: "This past spring break Katrina Ogden and I had the opportunity to present our research at the annual ESS, held in Boston. We were able to meet with publishing firms and universities who were selling books written by sociologists and psychologists. A fun thing about the conference was that they were handing out free journals from multiple disciplines that we could take home. It was also exciting to be able to meet other students studying sociology and professionals from the field who were presenting at the conference. During the Poster Session, we met with other students, where they discussed all their research methods and findings. The poster sessions lasted an hour and a half, but went by very quickly since you spent most of the time talking to other students and professors about your research. Overall, it was a great opportunity to practice discussing with others the processes of your research."

"Attending the CUGR showcase was an excellent experience, and a great chance to practice discussing my research with an unfamiliar audience."

This year's sociology department nomination for the CLAS Outstanding Graduating Student Award and recipient of the CLAS Senior Recognition Award for Sociology is Michael Lucas.



Michael's performance as a scholar and an athlete have been exemplary. His induction as a member of Alpha Kappa Delta Sociology Honor Society in Spring 2014 is a testament to his academic abilities. He is the captain of the UMaine Track and Field team excelling in hurdles and relay with a record of 3rd all time in the 400m intermediate hurdles.

This would seem to be as much as a student could handle well, but Michael is also becoming a Navy Seal. In February he assumed the position of Special Warfare/Operations New England Candidate (SWONEC) Boat Crew Leader of Region 1 Tac-1. After graduating and competing with the UMaine outdoor track and field team, he will leave for Navy boot camp in July.

We believe that this is the first time someone from the sociology department has been accepted into the Navy Seals. Michael is one of only two people from Maine who are in this program.

We wish Michael all the best as he pursues his Navy career. His long term plans are to continue his education by going to grad school. We know he will excel whatever he does!

First-ever NotMom Summit

Professor Amy Blackstone had the honor of giving the opening talk at the first-ever "NotMom Summit" in Cleveland, Ohio, in October 2015. Her talk, entitled "Who *Are the NotMoms?*" was a result of her extensive study of the childfree by choice.

As part of an Opinion piece from the Bangor Daily News dated November 24, 2015, Professor Blackstone explains the conference and the women who attended: "The 2015 NotMom Summit, the first of its kind, brought together women who are entrepreneurs, artists, business executives, authors, activists, academics, policy advocates, and, by any measure, accomplished leaders in their fields. At the summit they tackled big questions — exactly the sort we wish for our political representatives to consider.



They examined how to ensure a healthy future for our planet, how best to care for our elders and other loved ones, how to engage in thoughtful planning for old age, how to understand our workplace rights and how to speak up about workplace wrongs. They are women who have solutions to the most pressing social problems and they deserve to be heard."

The idea for this summit came from the success of the website thenotmom.com, started in 2011 by Karen Malone Wright. She recognized the need for a place where women who are childfree by choice or by chance could come together and find common ground. The next NotMom Summit will take place in October 2017. tern for Congressman Bruce Poliquin in Washington, D.C. This is what he had to say about the internship: "During this past summer, I had the distinct honor of serving Congressman Bruce Poliquin as an intern in Washington, D.C. office. Throughout the internship, I had many opportunities to apply the sociological lessons I learned during my time as an under-graduate in the University of Maine's sociology department. Some of the key issues of overlap were economic and social inequality in American politics at the national level including the hindering effect that PAC's and Super-PAC's have on hindering our democratic process and limiting the voices of the people by providing them false information on a massive scale. In addition, there were also several opportunities to view social issues from a macro-scale at our nation's governmental capital. One such issue was that of technological advances and relaxed regulations expanding access of pornography to the youngest members of our society, which in turn has several negative side-effects on these individuals. In sum, this experience was incredibly awarding and eye-opening for me as both an academic and as an American citizen considering a future in government and politics."

Trey is currently a candidate for the Maine State Legislature where he is running for the 147th district (Presque Isle) in the House of Representatives. If elected, he will be one of the youngest legislators in the country. In the Fall of 2016 Trey will be returning to the University of Maine to pursue an MBA before eventually attending law school.

We congratulate Trey on this achievement and wish him all the best in the future!!
