Course Description:

Two-week, interactive course provides an intermediate, in-depth study of the Orff-Schulwerk approach to music and movement education. Intended for pre-service music educators, emphasizes the Orff process as demonstrated and experienced through a range of creative activities and assignments during 60 contact hours. Specific applications for general music in grades K-12, topics include movement and musical skill development.

Prerequisites: completion of an approved Orff-Schulwerk Level I

Learning Goals:

Learning goals of this course include experiencing and describing the Orff process for the purpose of facilitating creative music and movement activities for students in grades K-12, through the four media of speech, movement, singing, and playing instruments.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs):

Organized by the three main focus areas, SLOs for this course describe the range of knowledge and skills needed to experience and understand the Orff-Schulwerk approach.

Basic Pedagogy SLOs include:

- performing and improvising using all identified meters (2/4, 3/4, 4/4, 6/8, and in 5 and 7), changing combinations, and without meter
- performing and improvising melodies in re, mi and sol pentatonic scales

- performing and improvising modal melodies in diatonic scales: Major: Ionian, Lydian, Mixolydian; Minor: Aeolian, Dorian, Phrygian.
- improvising over shifting accompaniments (e.g. tonic-supertonic and tonic-subtonic)
- composing and arranging using a variety of timbres appropriate to style and mood of the musical source
- performing and improvising in the following elemental forms: word patterns, phrase, elemental structures (aaab, aabb, abba, abac), small forms (aa, ab, aba), echo/antiphonal, question/answer, canon, rondo, verse/chorus
- presenting teaching demonstrations of melodies using a variety of approaches and Orff media (e.g. imitation, exploration, melodic reduction, melodic skeleton, solfege)
- analyzing and explaining teaching procedures for melodic improvisation in pentatonic, hexatonic and diatonic scales over borduns/drones and shifting accompaniments

Movement SLOs include:

- demonstrating group formations, timing, alignment, energy and spacing using locomotor steps while performing folk dances
- improvising intermediate dance formations and locomotor steps
- analyzing and explaining the relationship of cultural and ethnic understandings
- presenting teaching demonstrations of known folk dance choreographies
- analyzing and explaining the teaching procedures at this level as modeled by the instructor

Recorder SLOs include:

- demonstrating correct finger technique for playing two diatonic octaves on alto recorder, including accidentals appropriate to the mode or scale
- demonstrating expressive musicality on both soprano and alto recorders varying breath, articulation, and fingering as appropriate
- improvising melodies using elemental forms (aaab, abab, abba, abac, abac) using alto recorder
- improvising modal melodies over drone accompaniments and shifting triads (e.g., I-II, I-VII, I-III, I-VI) using alto recorder
- demonstrating breathing and articulation techniques appropriate for ensemble playing
- evaluating age-appropriateness of music for advanced elementary and middle school students according to specific criteria (e.g., quality, potential for differentiation, and interest of the student)

Course Requirements:

- Regular attendance and participation in class activities.
- Timely completion of written assignments.

Assignments and Late Work Policy:

Students will receive **full credit** for complete, correct assignments submitted on time. Students will receive **partial credit** awarded on a sliding scale for incomplete assignments containing substantial errors submitted on time. Students will receive **no credit** for missing assignments.

Course Schedule
