ELECTION RESULTS: Tripp & Shelmerdine Elected President, VP!

Keegan Tripp, a 20-year-old Political Science major and incumbent Student Body President, was reelected alongside his new running mate, Cynthia Shelmerdine, a 20-year-old Biochemical Engineering major. Campaigning on a platform of finishing key projects and preparing for UMSG's long-term future, the duo emphasized community building and organizational stability. The pair were inaugurated on April 24th alongside the new executive team and are excited to serve the student body in the year ahead.

SAF Raise Referendum Results

This spring, UMaine students approved the first significant Student Activity Fee (SAF) increase in over a decade. Previously only tied to inflation, the SAF had fallen behind the growing needs of the student body. After months of discussion regarding UMSG's financial sustainability, the General Student Senate placed a \$22 per-semester increase referendum on the executive election ballot, where it passed with 72% support. This vote strengthens the foundation for campus involvement and reaffirms our community's commitment to investing in student-led initiatives. FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY REFORMS

This semester, Student Government faced a tighter budget than anticipated —an issue that has been building for years. As UMSG strengthens its connection with the student body and more organizations become aware of and utilize our resources, demand has continued to rise while our budget remained unchanged. At the same time, rising costs across the board have further strained our ability to support student organizations at precedented levels. What was once sufficient for fewer clubs and organizations had to be stretched further, revealing inequities in the distribution of the Student Activity Fee. In response, President Tripp authored several financial policy reforms, and the Senate implemented caps on maximum annual budget allocations to ensure all students have equitable access to the funds they contribute to. These changes are designed to stabilize the budget and promote fairness in funding for years to come. For more details, check out the article by Haden Buzzell!

Partnering with the Center for Student Involvement, we're excited to launch a streamlined process for student organizations via our unified platform, Campus Groups. Students can now initiate applications for club recognition, reserve storage space, and soon submit funding requests, all with a few clicks. This modernization eliminates the hassle of printed forms, saving time and creating a more efficient experience for everyone.





CLUB STORAGE INITIATIVE

To address the long-standing challenge of storage space for student clubs, President Tripp and VPSO Levesque established and implemented a Club Storage Program. This initiative provides a two-tier storage solution: 27 lockers in the Wade Center for smaller storage needs, distributed on a first-come, first-served basis, and off-campus storage units for organizations with larger equipment, funded through requests to the EBC. By offering secure and accessible storage, this has already helped alleviate the burden on student leaders who previously relied on personal spaces like their dorms---ensuring equitable and convenient access to resources and supporting the long-term sustainability of student organizations.





RECORD MEMBERSHIP

The General Student Senate has reached a record number of student senators (28) — the highest since the campus's recovery from the COVID-19 Pandemic. Thanks to dedicated recruitment efforts by VPSL Oldfield and broader improvements in transparency and outreach, every college is now represented. For the first time in nearly a decade, Senate seats are becoming competitive, marking a significant milestone in student engagement.

INFRASTRUCTURE ADVOCACY

Under the leadership of MCEC Senator and now VP Cynthia Shelmerdine, UMSG has taken on a formal role in campus infrastructure planning—giving students a direct voice in decisions that shape their environment. While all students can submit requests under Operational Maintenance and Compliance, UMSG now holds exclusive authority to submit under Functional Renewal & Improvement and the Annual Call—two categories that fund meaningful upgrades like improved lighting, safer crosswalks, and accessible walkways. This process, developed over the past year, allows student leaders to identify issues, submit proposals through committee, and advocate for solutions that prioritize day-to-day student needs—bringing long-overdue attention to areas previously overlooked in top-down planning.

UMSG EMERGING LEADER: MATT WEBBER MBS SENATOR


